Science students launch hot air balloons

Building a hot-air balloon is no easy task. Eighth graders at the Hillsboro Junior High know this first-hand. During the week of May 3-7, eighth graders in Laura Burgio's and Mary Beth Sapper's science classes got the chance to build their very own hot-air balloons.

The balloons were made from tissue paper and stood about five feet tall. They were an array of different colors.

Some were arranged in orderly colored patterns, while others resembled quilts. Not only did all eighth grade students build their own hot-air balloons, but they also had the chance to watch them be launched into the air.

On Thursday, May 13, students spent

the class period outside to watch the launching of the balloons.

Burgio and Sapper launched the balloons using hot air produced from a barbecue pit. A large piece of sheet metal with a hole cut in the center was placed over the flame.

A column of coffee cans was placed over the hole to direct the hot air. The teachers, very carefully and wearing oven mitts and using a pair of tongs, held the balloons at a safe distance above the column until the balloon was filled with hot air. Once the balloons were completely full, there was a count of three, and the balloons were released.

Some of the colorful contraptions flew so high into the air that students could barely see them, while others

of the importance of communicating with parents.

Parents will help control and support the school to educate their children if they know that there is something that needs to be addressed at home. And the earlier in the child's education that good communication is established, the easier it is to effect a positive change. Parents of children beginning kindergarten in August may want to consider our summer school program. In fact, summer school will offer enrichment, exploration, and remediation to students at all grade levels.

Jury duty

Students must make difficult decisions in mock trials

Trial one was about a Union soldier who was charged with three counts of deserting. The Union soldier, though, had a good defense. The soldier had received a letter from his wife stating that she and the children were starving and that his little

girl had died of hunger.

In trial two, a young man was arrested while trying to bring in Jesse James and Bloody Bill Anderson. The young man was charged with stealing, looting and murder. In that young man's defense, he said, "I was riding with them undercover to discover their hideout and give the Union army a chance to arrest them."

Zundel's class studied the Civil War for about three weeks. During that time, the class prepared the trial. The students who played the lawyers had to write their own opening and closing statements, along with their questions for witnesses.

"Just watching how much they improved throughout the

barely made it off the ground. Still others ended up dangling from the tops of trees.

After the balloons fell back down to earth, the students ran after them and either kept them or used them as fuel for the fire.

The students are currently learning about weather and weather conditions. The balloons reinforce the fact that hot air rises and sinks as it cools. The students also took record of the air temperature, wind speed and direction, relative humidity, air pressure, and dew point temperature the day of the launch. Then they studied the effects these conditions had on the balloons.

"The students see firsthand as the balloons lift up from a heat source and then fall as the air cools and condenses," Burgio said.

Burgio has been doing this project

with her students for about six years now, and she says that the students typically enjoy it. She and Sapper plan to continue this project with their students in the future.

In “Summer Safari” there are many classes to choose from. Some classes involve learning about different types of books and authors, cooking, and sewing.

Classes offered to grades first through fourth are Laura Ingalls Wilder Mania, Art of Puzzling, Arts & Crafts, Game Room, Computer Games, 3...2...1 Blast Off!, Outdoor Games, Lifetime Sports, Let’s Make Music, Rain Forest, Dinosaurs, Library Safari, The Cooking Club, Exploring Nature, and Let’s Get Messy.

The classes offered only to grades third and fourth are A Summer with Native Americans, Cooking Across America, Hola!, and Incredible Insects.

In Laura Ingalls Wilder Mania, students will learn about the author of the Little House on the Prairie books, and experience the life of a pioneer child.

3...2...1 Blast Off is a hands-on class. The students will be making planes and shoot off a model rocket.

Students who take Library Safari will spend time in the library exploring books and stories from around the world. There will also be story time, puppet plays, board games, and puzzles.

A Summer with Native Americans will teach the students about another culture while exploring the Native American culture through music, art, games, food, literature, and research activities. The students will even be putting on their own pow wow.

“Pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classes will have many activities similar to the older students. Students will enjoy arts and crafts, music lessons, story time, and puppets. Science team competes, places 11th at state

Members of the Science Olympiad team from Hillsboro Junior High had a winning season this year, complete with placing in the state competition.

On Saturday March 6, a team of nine eighth graders and five ninth graders competed at Hazelwood West High School. Hillsboro joined St. Louis County teams such as Ladue, Sperrung Middle School, Crestview, Wydown, and Gateway Tech.

This is the second year in a row the Hillsboro Science Olympiad team has placed high enough to earn a trip to the State Science Olympiad.

"The competition at the St. Louis Regional Science Olympiad was very stiff as we are the only competing team from Jefferson County," said Laura Burgio, Hillsboro's Science Olympiad coach, who is also an eighth grade science teacher at Hillsboro Junior High. "This year I think we did a lot better, and we won more awards than any of the previous years."

The students of the Science Olympiad earned a total of 34 medals and ribbons at the St. Louis Regional Science Olympiad competition. The first place winners of the individual events were Caroline Paillou and Ashley Tucker in "Crime Busters." Tiffany Samons placed second in three events: "Water Quality," "Astronomy," and "Bridge." Cody Russell and Christian Nuckols earned second place in "Wheeled Ve-

hicle," along with Bobby Walker in "Storm the Castle," Luke Penning in "Science of Fitness," Nathan Carroll in "Water Quality," Adam St. John in "Astronomy," and Rebecca Pooker in "Rockets," "Bridge," and "Write It-Do It."

On Saturday, April 24, the State Science Olympiad competition was held at the University of Missouri in Columbia. There were 32 teams who made it to the state competition; Hillsboro came in 11th place.

"Last year we came in 17th place at the state competition, so we greatly improved our performance at the state level this year," Burgio said. "The year usually starts out with over 100 teams statewide; to finish 11th out of everyone is quite an accomplishment."

The second place winners of the individual events were Ashley Tucker and Caroline Paillou in "Science Crime Busters." Ashley Tucker and Rebecca Pooker placed third in "Write It-Do It." The fourth place winners were Ashley Tucker, Caroline Paillou, and Alisha Hester for "Picture This." Rebecca Pooker and Nathan Carroll placed fifth in "Road Scholar."

"We have been working and studying really hard for these events nearly every day after school since the end of August," Burgio said. "The students learn to improve social skills as they must work together to accomplish all of the studying and building of the projects."

"Science Olympiad includes nearly

every aspect of science from engineering to biology," she said. "It really gives the kids who have an extra interest in science a chance to find out specifically where their interests are. They can start determining if they prefer more of the life sciences, chemical aspects, or the physical sciences. This can aid them in future career choices."

The musical revue will be titled "Broadway A-Z" and will include different clips from several different musicals starting with the letter A and going through the alphabet. There will be no main

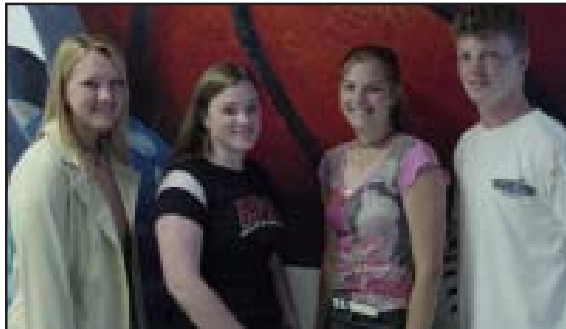
